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Introduction

Nagaland was declared as the Sixteenth State of India on 1st December 1963. The state is surrounded by Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Manipur, and Myanmar. Its population is around 2 million as per census of 2001.

People of Nagaland are of Indo-Mongoloid stock, whose ancestors have been living by nature and mutual love. There is no common dialect but rather 60 dialects. English is the official language of the state.

Dimapur is the only airport in Nagaland and is connected by air to Delhi, Kolkata and rest of the country. The state's main livelihood is also at Dimapur.

Agriculture provides 90 percent of the people with their livelihood. The Forests, which cover 17 percent area of Nagaland, are its most important source of income. There are varied mineral reserves, including oil deposits, but almost no exploration. There are sugar mill, paper mill, fruit juice factory and plywood factory in Dimapur. Handloom and Handicrafts remain important.

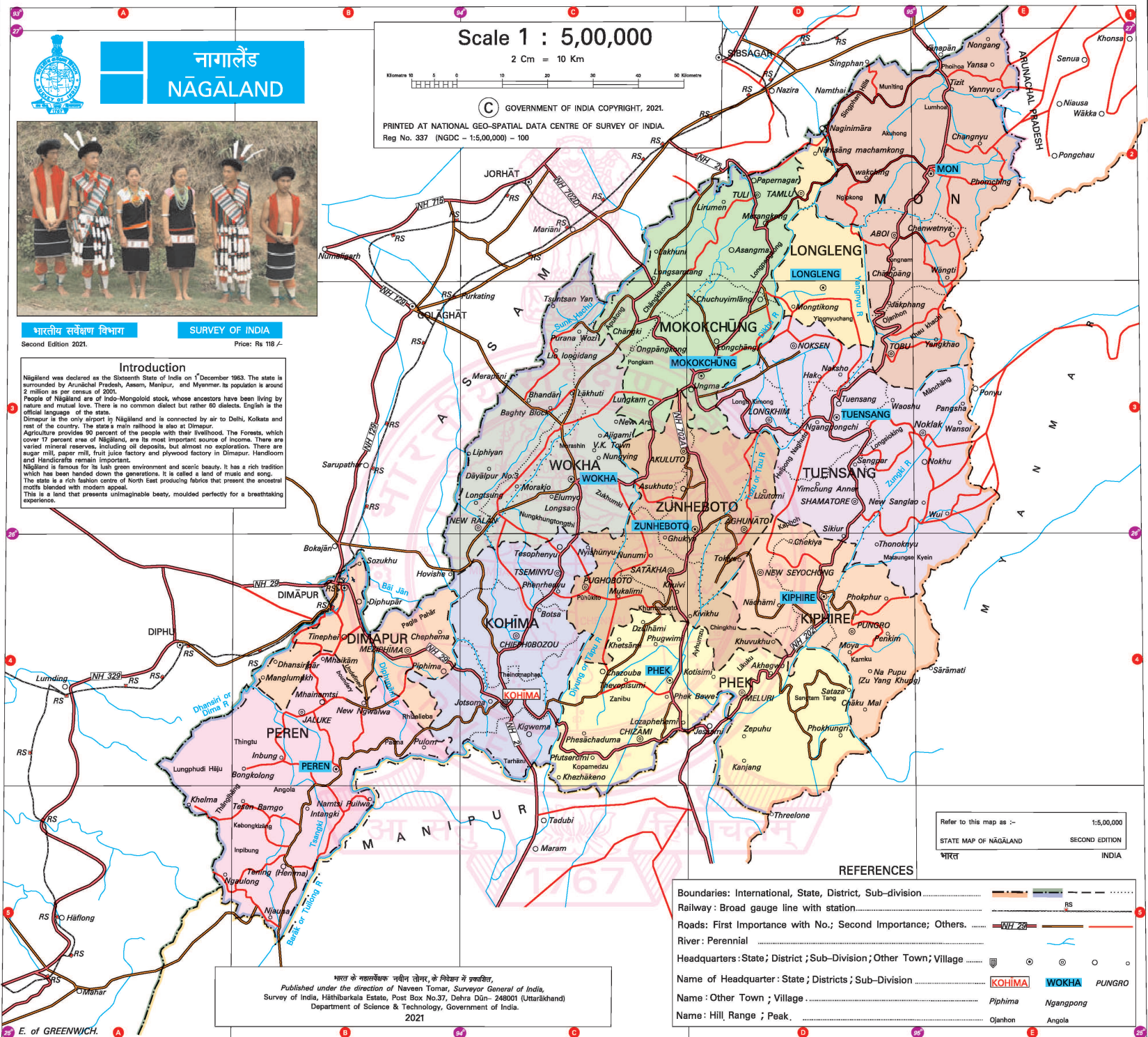
